Daily, we die to live. In this circumstance, dying entails giving up something for the sake of a higher good. In today's Gospel reading (John 12:20-33), Jesus emphasized the fact that a grain of wheat must die to produce many grains of wheat, if not it will remain a single grain of wheat. As a single grain of wheat must die to produce many grains of wheat, Jesus must die for the salvation of many. Our Lord Jesus Christ is the One "who gave Himself for our sins so that He might rescue us from this present evil age, according to the will of our God and Father (Galatians 1:4). Some people have given up their lives for the welfare of their countries. The bird, the pelican, feeds her children with her blood. According to St. John Vianney, "Here is a rule for everyday life: do not do anything which you cannot offer to God." What are the things we do that we cannot be proud to offer to God? We need to die to bad habits or inclinations and sins in this earthly life. Pride, which we need to get rid of in our lives, is a major obstacle to eternal life. Humility makes us accept who we are and seek help from God our source or fount of help. According to Archbishop Fulton Sheen, "The worst thing on earth is not sin but denial of sin." NO ONE ON EARTH IS PERFECT. We need to refrain from seeing ourselves as better than others. This act makes one condemn others and hinders one from trying to improve. Most of us want to please God with our lives but human weaknesses and selfish desires or inclinations are preventing us from achieving our goals. Some people are struggling to die to the desires, habits, or deeds that displease God. We need to encourage each other. It is not humanly easy to overcome long-time acquired habits or to resist some ungodly desires in our present world. In our Gospel reading last weekend (John 3:14-21), Jesus pointed out that He did not come to the world to condemn the world but to save the world most especially those who believe in Him.
